







Standardized Weighted Social Development Index Scores



Overview of Social Development Sub-indexes




SDI - Family Solidarity Sub-index




☐ Family solidarity sub-index has improved, though it remains at the negative.

Emerging Family Issues

- 1. Decreasing number of marriages (lower tendency to get married)
- 2. Increase in cohabitation
- 3. Increase in cross-border marriages
- 4. Increase in non-intact families (divorce, re-marriage)
- 5. Increase in child abuse and battered spouse cases
- 6. Increase in extra-marital affairs

Emerging Family Issues


- 7. Decreasing number of children



Government's Responsibility

Family Council

- to advocate for cherishing the family as a main driver for social harmony
- to advise the Government on the formulation of policies and strategies
- to advise the Government on the integration of family policies and related programmes
- to plan/implement programmes and activities (different populations)
- to initiate family research

Family Perspectives in Policy Formulation

- mandatory assessment of family implications for all policies
- encouraging Government
 Bureaux/departments to consult the Council
- Basis: family core values (Love and Care;
 Respect and Responsibilities;
 Communication and Harmony
- Basis: family's structure and functions
- Subcommittees on promotion of family core values, family support and family education

The Pyramid of CSR

Philanthropic Responsibilities

Be a good corporate citizen. Contribute resources to the community; improve quality of life.

Ethical Responsibilities

Be ethical.

Obligation to do what is right, just, and fair. Avoid harm.

Legal Responsibilities

Obey the law.

Law is society's codification of right and wrong. Play by the rules of the game.

Economic Responsibilities

Be profitable.

Family Friendly Policies

- parental leave (e.g., getting report cards)
- paternity leave
- time off for family emergencies
- "genuine" job sharing
- working at home during normal working hours (a question of trust)
- workplace or other nursery provision
- flexi-time (a question of trust)
- Issue: question of trust
- Issue: more time = better family quality?
- Issue: More evaluation needed

Corporate Involvement in Mentoring Programs

- Holds great potential for fostering competency in the context of significant threats to development
- Research shows one "good" relationship can serve an important ameliorative function, which can place high-risk youth on positive developmental trajectories
- Mentoring families with greater needs?

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Non-Governmental Sector's Responsibility

Lack of Measures of Chinese Family Quality of Life

- Translated family measures included measures of family burdens, marital adjustment, parenting, parent-child relationship, and family functioning
- •Few indigenously developed family functioning measures such as the Family Assessment Instrument and parenting have been developed
- Implications for evidence-based family practice

Evidence-Based Family Enhancement Programs

- There was a paucity of evidence-based adolescent developmental programs in different Chinese contexts
- A similar conclusion can be applied to evidence-based family programs
- •Four types of programs that are needed -validated parenting programs with local materials; marital enrichment programs; family therapy programs; family life education programs for adolescents

The Quest for Effective Family Enhancement Program

6 Possible types of programs:

- 1. Ineffective or harmful intervention
- 2. Intervention unlikely to be beneficial
- 3. Intervention with unknown effectiveness
- 4. Intervention with both benefits and adverse effects
- 5. Intervention likely to be beneficial
- 6. Intervention is effective reflected by clear evidence

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Parents' Responsibility

Emergent Parenting Issues

- "Strict fathers, kind mothers" to "strict mothers, kind fathers" and "involved mothers, detached fathers)
- Over-emphasis on academic excellence
- Psychological control over behavioral control
- Withering of "family teaching"
- Withering of "role models"
- Families with young adults

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Children's Responsibility

Emergence of Popular and Youth Cultures in Hong Kong

- Decline in respect for parents:「黑白天鵝,日哦夜哦」
- Detachment between parents and their adolescent children: 「有大有細」
- Focus on self: 「你有你要求,我有我感受」,「意見接受,做法照舊」
- Fast food culture: 「百份百感覺」,「啱feel」,「勉強無幸福」,「不在乎天長地久,只在乎曾經擁有」
- Divergent standards in human relationships:「如果踩親你…咪對唔住囉」
