CD in UK - Home Office

Active Citizenship Centre

- Background
 - ► a vital tenet of the Government's Philosophy of Civil Renewal
 - Development of strong, active and empowered communities
 - People are to do things for themselves
 - Define the problems they face
 - Tackle the problems in partnership with public bodies

Tasks

- Promote research that demonstrates the value of civil renewal
- Inform policymaking in such area
- Fund direct projects and/or researches in different fields and areas of the country
- Partnership between policy makers, academics, practitioners and citizens

CD in UK - Home Office

Civil Renewal Unit

- Missions
 - Local people have the networks, the knowledge, the sense of what is actually possible, the ability to make solutions stick
 - Building the capacity, the social assets, and leadership in the local communities

People should be encouraged to solve their own problems in part—develop rights and responsibilities going hand in hand

CD in UK - Home Office

Active Citizenship Centre

- improving quality of life
- social justice
- about meaningful participation which makes democracy and accountability a reality

Civil Renewal Unit

- reinvigorating communities
- helping citizens to have more fulfilling lives

New Deal for Community (NDC)

- 39 New Deal for Community Projects in UK
- Each project is funded about GBP 56 million, last for 10 years
- Four criteria for selecting the service area: crime rate, educational level, low-income or high employment rate, poor housing

Ocean, Stepney

Ocean Estate is situated in Stepney of East London

2,000 households, about 6,500 population, each NDC project served not more than 4,000 households

► Ocean Estate - NDC



Vision:

In ten years time the Ocean will be beautiful place to live at the heart of London, rich in its culture, education and employment"

Strategic Themes:

1. A place to be proud of - Neighbourhood Renewal
 Increase the social & economic capacity of the estate
 To enable residents to participate fully in the decision making
 Increase levels of involvement in local community activities from 42% to 55%

Strategic Themes:

- 2. A place to learn Education
 - Significantly raise the education attainment levels of school pupils towards the national average
 - Reduce the proportion of working age residents who have difficulty with English

3. A place that works – Employment

reduced the no. of unemployed and economically inactive people

Provide adequate childcare support

▶ Reduce households with an income < \pounds 10,000

Strategic Themes:

- 4. A place that cares Health and Social Care
 - Reduce residents reporting poor health
 - Reduce number of households with long term care needs not receiving assistance
- 5. A place to enjoy Arts, Sports and Culture
 Increase satisfaction in leisure, arts, cultural and sports facilities
 - Improve outdoor play provision

Strategic Themes:

- 6. A place that is safe Community Safety
 - Reduce residents' fear of crime by 50%
 - Reduce the use of drugs in the area
 - ► Reduce burglaries by 50%

7. A place to live - The Building Environment

- Reduce overcrowding from 27%
- Create an attractive environment with good quality open spaces
 & desirable homes that provide a range of housing choices for local people

Partnership Structure & Responsibilities

- The Board responsible for the strategic direction and implementation of NDC program
- First 2 years—accountable to London Borough of Tower Hamlets
- Year 3—transfer to the Partnership Board
- Resident led and made up of at least 51% residents, up to 75%
- Residents representatives will be elected annually by community ballot

Sanctuary Housing







The Partnership Board

- Among 19 members of the board, 10 residents are board members
- 4 representatives from local voluntary sector organizations
- Others from Tower Hamlets Council, Tower Hamlets Health Authority, Metropolitan Police & business

CD in UK - Communities Scotland

took over most functions of Scottish Home on 1 Nov 2001

 Communities Scotland is the Scottish Executive's housing & regeneration agency
 report to Communities Minister

► Aim:

 To work with others to develop strong communities and raise the quality of Scotland's housing

Total Communities Scotland programme for 2004/05: £600m = HK\$8,400m

CD in UK - Communities Scotland

work with:

National – e.g. Scottish Enterprise
 Regional – e.g. Health Boards, Police
 Local – e.g. Local Authority
 Community – e.g. Local people & community organisation

► achieve by:

Managing targeted investment
Raising standards
Improving understanding

CD in UK - Communities Scotland

Area teams

- 8 teams throughout Scotland
- manage targeted investment in housing & regeneration
- Integration of SIPs with Community Planning Partnership
- promote the social economy & wider role of Has
- support local authorities in the development of housing strategies

Regeneration division

- Develop sound knowledge & information base through research and neighbourhood intelligence
- Identify & disseminate good practice
- Support community learning and adult literacy & numeracy
- Housing information & tenant participation
- Investment & Performance division
- Regulation & Inspection division

Edinburgh Youth Social Inclusion Project

Background

- 4,600 young people in Edinburgh revealed that 49% of them do not feel Edinburgh is a good city to be young in
- high unemployment rate (65%)
- Vision
 - develop an accurate picture of youth social exclusion in Edinburgh
 - work with organisations and young people to develop and test solutions

Aims

- Research & data co-ordination
- Action research programme
- Policy development
- Capacity building
- Partnership working



North Edinburgh Childcare

- Background
 - Iocated at Pilton, North Edinburgh



- developed in response to an identified need for affordable, flexible childcare in North Edinburgh that would enable local parents and carers access increased opportunities for work, training or education
- a group of local women campaigned over a number of years for the creation of a custom built childcare facility
- ▶ in the Spring of 1997, North Edinburgh Children opened
- a voluntary board of local people manage the project
- a staff team of 50, including many local residents, run day-to-day service
- Childcare
- Crèche Services
- Training Services

Forth Sector – Six Mary's Place

- Background
 - Over 5000 people in Edinburgh have experienced problems with mental health and are currently unemployed

Aims

- To create opportunities for people to experience the many positive benefits that come from real, meaningful and stimulating occupation within a work culture of understanding, acceptance and nurture.
- To overcome exclusion and provide opportunities for people with mental health problems to develop their core skills while making a gradual and supported return to employment.
- To provide a secure base in order to facilitate a process of recovery for the participants.

Forth Sector – Six Mary's Place

- 6 social business
 - -Rolls on Wheels
 - -Edinburgh Embroidery Services
 - -Ithos

-Six Mary's Place Guesthouse -Parkview Laundry Service -The Soap Co Edinburgh

- Six Mary's Place Guesthouse
 - Building dates from 1829 in Stockbridge, 10mins from city centre
 - ▶ 8 fully ensuite B & B
 - 2004 Scottish Thistle Award for Outstanding Customer Care

Experience of CD in UK

Community Regeneration

- Not bulldozing, but regeneration
- Emphases on residents participation and community development

Partnership Working

- Collaboration with different organisations
- Emphases on public, private and local organisations

Bottom-up Participation

Value local residents and community participation

Experience of CD in UK

Small Scale

Focus on quality, not only quantity

Community Base

Consider community as service intervention unit

Social Enterprises

- Not only employment training
- But employment opportunity
