- Holtzworth-Munroe & Stuart's (1994)Typology
 - Family-only
 - Dysphoric / Borderline Personality
 - Anti-social Personality

- Family Only
 - High Dependency on Partner
 - Low Levels of Impulsivity
 - Poor Communication Skills
 - Family of Origin Violence

- Dysphoric/ Borderline Personality
 - Parental Rejection
 - Child Abuse (Family of Origin Violence)
 - High Dependency on Partner
 - Poor Communication
 - Poor Social Skills
 - Hostile to Women
 - Low Remorse

- Anti-social Personality
 - Family of Origin Violence
 - Delinquency
 - Deficits in Communication, Social Skills
 - Violence Viewed as Appropriate Response

Psychological Impact on the Battered

- Battered Woman Syndrome
 - Learned Helplessness
 - Depression
 - Cycle of Violence
 - Tension Building
 - Acute Battering Incident
 - Loving Contrition

Psychological Impact on the Battered

- Post-traumatic Stress Disorder
 - Re-experiencing
 - Memory, Flashback, Nightmare
 - Avoidance
 - Thoughts, Place, People, Activity
 - Increased Arousal
 - Hypervigilant, Sleeping Problem, Concentration Problem

Psychological Impact on the Battered

- Parenting
 - Lower Parental Warmth
 - Poor Tolerance for Stress
 - Over Focus on Negative Behavior
 - Higher Control
 - React with Aggression or Withdrawal
 - Role Confusion

Psychological Impact on Child Victim


- Post-traumatic Stress Disorder
 - Re-experiencing
 - Repetitive play, nightmares, night terrors,
 - Separation Anxiety, Stranger Anxiety
 - Avoidance
 - Spacing out, Phobic behavior, Regressive Behavior, School Refusal, Dissociate
 - Increased Arousal
 - Sleeping Problem, Oppositional, Inattentive to Instructions, Startle Response

Psychological Impact on Child Victim

- Psychosomatic Problem
 - Bedwetting, Headache
- Childhood Depression
- Anger, Aggression and Revenge
- Powerlessness and Pseudo-Power
- Self-image, Shame, Self-isolation
- Underachieve or Overachieve

Consideration on Intervention

- Batterer minimizes violence; Battered underestimates violence
- Effect of joint interview
- Spouse Abuse Vs Child Abuse
- Possible negative impact of intervention when violence not ceased
- Risk in separation

Working With Larger System

- Integrating the work of different subsystems and agencies is apt to be time-consuming, but perhaps no more than handling the negative effects of poor coordination.
- Understanding that different agencies are interactive forces within the network encompassing a family is a cornerstone of collaborative work.
